
The Numbers Behind the Crime



- In the United States, there are over 2,000,000 home burglaries every year.
- Many burglars are able to enter homes through unsecured windows or doors.
- Burglars usually spend 60 seconds trying to break into a home.
- Burglars spend an average of 8 to 12 minutes inside a home.
- Jewelry, electronics, and cash are the most targeted items during a burglary.
- · Victims of home burglaries report an average of \$2,000 in losses.
- Police recover only about 15% of stolen property.
- Most burglaries happen during the daytime.
- July and August have the highest percentage of burglaries.
- · Homes without security systems are 2 to 3 times more likely to be broken into.

Protect Your Neighborhood

Join a local crime-fighting organization, such as Neighborhood or Apartment Watch. These are effective crime prevention programs that enable you to take an active role in the safety of your neighborhood. Organizing a crime watch program builds trust and a sense of community among neighbors. Reliable neighbors can be effective in helping to ensure your home's security.

- Look out for your neighbors as you expect them to look out for you.
- Report suspicious activities to the police immediately.
- Work with others in your community to eliminate things that may contribute to crime, like overgrown vacant lots or abandoned cars.



Use this checklist of simple and affordable security measures to protect your home and your family from crime.



Plan Security for Vacations Arrangements are made for a trusted friend or neighbor to watch for intruders, pick up mail, etc. Voice mail does not identify that you are on vacation or away from your home. Timers are set to turn lights and a radio or TV on and off. Car is left in the driveway to provide the illusion of occupancy. Vacation address and telephone number are given to a trusted neighbor in case of emergency. Alarm system is armed. Spare keys are given to a trusted neighbor, not left under a doormat, planter, or in the mailbox. Beware of Strangers



- Household members know to withold information such as their name and address from strangers.
- Visitors are always identified through a peephole or window, even if their voice sounds familiar.
- Strangers who need help are asked to wait outside as household members make phone calls for them.
- Unscheduled visits from repairmen or utility workers are verified with a call to their company.
- Household members know not to post personal information, like their address, online.
- Babysitters and latchkey kids have of list of people who are safe to let in.

Personal Property =

■ Valuable items are inscribed with an identifying number approved by local police.

sensitive devices

- An inventory of valuable possessions is up to date and includes pictures. This information is stored in a safe location or through a secure, online storage website.
- ☐ Shed doors and gate latches are locked after every use with high-security, laminated padlocks.
- Outdoor valuables like grills and lawnmowers are stored in a locked garage or shed. If they are kept outside, they are hidden from view and locked to a stationary point.
- Bicycles are secured with U-bar locks or high quality padlocks and chains at all times, even when left for a short period of time
