

MOLLY

Molly is a “pure” form of Ecstasy. Unlike the drug it mimics, Molly is not usually mixed with ingredients like caffeine or other drugs.

The information about Molly is extremely deceptive, leading some users to believe it is safer than Ecstasy, which is not the case.

DRUG_I.D.

Looks: Looks like a white powder, stored in capsules or pill form. May be yellowish in color and have licorice smell.

Street Names: Sassafras, Ecstasy; dealers use the word “Molly” to make users think they are getting the purest form of the drug, but that isn’t necessarily true of the product they are selling.

Methods of Use: Injected or snorted

Actions: Effects occur within 45 minutes typically; Lowers inhibitions and affects sense of reality

Warning Signs: Psychological effects, hallucinations, heart trouble, organ failure

TRAGEDIES

Death from Molly occurs frequently by overdose or suicide, because of the psychological effects.

In 2012, 7 people were charged with conspiring to import Molly after its use caused the death of a young man in Alaska.
